Vowel Pronunciation (Always Consistent)

A: like "a" in "father"

Examples: casa, mapa

E: like "e" in "bed"

Examples: mesa, verde

like "ee" in "see"

Examples: libro, fin

O: like "o" in "go"

Examples: hola, dos

U: like "oo" in "moon"

Examples: luna, uno

Key Consonants (Different from English)

H: always SILENT

Examples: hola, hora

J: like "h" in "huge"

Examples: jamón, trabajo

Ñ: like "ny" in "canyon"

Examples: niño, año

LL: like "y" in "yes"

Examples: llave, calle

RR: rolled "r" sound

Examples: perro, carro

Common Pronunciation Mistakes

- DON'T pronounce "h" like English "h" it's SILENT
- DON'T pronounce "j" like English "j" it's like "h" in "huge"
- × DON'T skip rolling "r" sounds practice makes perfect
- DON'T pronounce "ll" like English "ll" it's like "y" in "yes"
- DON'T confuse "ñ" with "n" they're different sounds

Regional Pronunciation Differences

Spain: "z" and "c" (before e/i) pronounced like "th" in "think"

Latin America: "z" and "c" (before e/i) pronounced like "s"

Argentina/Uruguay: "Il" and "y" pronounced like "sh" in "ship"

Did You Know? (Historical Context)

Until 2010, the Spanish alphabet had 29 letters!

The Royal Spanish Academy (RAE) officially removed CH, LL, and RR as separate letters, reducing the alphabet to 27 letters. This affects alphabetical ordering in dictionaries - older materials may list these combinations in separate sections.



Accent Marks (Tildes) - Not Separate Letters!

Letters like á, é, í, ó, ú are the same vowels with accent marks to show stress. Examples: café (coffee), teléfono (telephone), música (music).
